Host an event or observe on your own! Events range from small family gatherings to community celebrations and can be held virtually or in person.

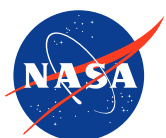
OBSERVE

EXPLORE

We are sending humans to the Moon! 50 years after the Apollo program first landed on the lunar surface, NASA's Artemis program is working to bring crewed missions to the Moon once again. A fleet of robotic spacecraft is helping us prepare to land safely and in areas of rich scientific interest. International Observe the Moon Night is an opportunity to discuss the past, present, and future of planetary science and exploration.

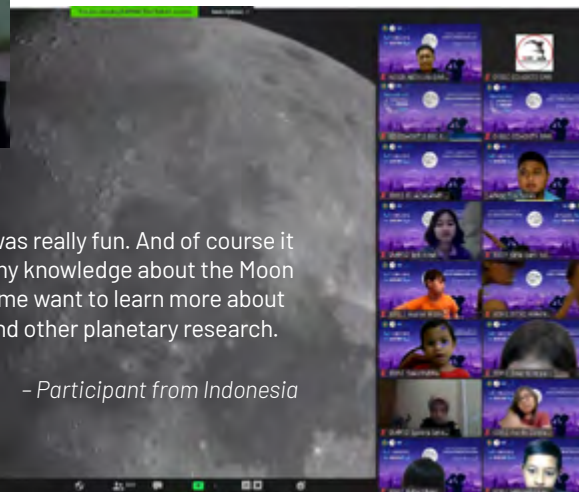
